CALL TO ORDER

David Dowse called the meeting to order at 6:40 p.m., and those present introduced themselves, including two guests. There was some discussion but there was general agreement that the story is most unlikely. Someone noted that the book, in most editions, starts with a dedication to Mr. Robinson by Doyle, saying that the legend had been recounted to Doyle by Fletcher Robinson, and thanking him for the idea.
