ITEMS OF BUSINESS AND GENTLE TRANSACTION

- 4. When Watson resided with Holmes at 221B Baker Street, did Watson have his little corner "man cave" where he cold retire to recharge his batteries and seek tranquility from the frantic life with Holmes?
- 5. Where and when did Holmes learn to box, fence, and the art of Baritsu and who were his teachers?
- 6. The extremely messy habit that Holmes had of after having read and gleaned the necessary information from the several daily newspapers, he would have thrown them into the corners of the room. If not picked up it must have created somewhat of a fire hazard. Did Watson, Mrs. Hudson, Billy have to pick up after him and did they complain?
- 7. Did Holmes ever ride in a car or plane and did he ever take the Tube?
- 8. Due to the publication of the adventures in the Strand, did Holmes have a rabid female following fan club, like Holmes's Honeys?
- 9. As we have seen today with highly organized criminal organizations, when the top man is taken down there is a civil war among the lower-ranking henchmen to succeed. So too it must have been when Moriarty left the scene. Who stepped into his shoes and became the Napoleon II of crime?
- 10. When Holmes visited the British Library to pick up some reference books, did he ever forget to bring them back?
- 11. How did Holmes with Watson, Mrs. Hudson, Mycroft, Lestrade, Billy and even Wiggins celebrate his birthday? What does one get Holmes as a present?
- 12. We know that Mrs. Hudson was an excellent cook. What was Holmes's favourite dish and what foods did he detest?
- 13. Did Holmes ever read for pleasure and who were those authors?
- So many questions, some albeit inconsequential, but if answered could better fill out the Sleuth of Baker Street, The Master.

I give you, Sherlock Holmes.

This venerable community landmark was the site of our July 7th, 1980 dinner marking the 50th anniversary of the death of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, and a number of Sherlock Holmes Birthday Dinners. Closed for a time, the inn is now under new management and scheduled to be reopened soon.

6. Toast to Dr. Watson by Wilfrid

As our Society is well into its fourth decade, I'm given to reflect on the fact that we have met, without fail, six times a year since 1979. I don't know how many literary societies, Sherlockian or otherwise, can boast such a fine record but I do know that it is only through Dr. Watson's assiduity in chronicling the Master's adventures that we are constantly finding new aspects of them to debate and discuss. As an aside, perhaps the person to whom we should be truly thankful, is Dr. Watson's orderly Murray, who saved his life after he was wounded at the battle of Maiwand, by throwing him on a packhorse and leading him to safety. Possibly another chronicler may have appeared to recount the Master's adventures; indeed, given Holmes's repute, it's quite probable that someone else would have. But can we imagine a person with just the right combination of discretion, shrewdness, confidant, catalyst and literary skills of the good Doctor? I for one cannot.

It is therefore with great pleasure that I propose the toast to Dr. Watson.

7. A Gift with Magnetism

Wilfrid received a unique gift from his sister-in-law, a set of fridge magnets in the form of a London map. Segments included Westminster Abbey, the Tower Bridge, Big Ben, a red telephone box, and others.

8. Indispensable for Your Journey

Jack, due to his qualifications as an urban planner, and hence a big fan of maps related to this, showed us a set of same recording the London of 1894 with every church, house and pub indicated. He also treated us to *Bradshaw's Railway Map 1907: Great Britain and Ireland* which truly allowed anyone to get to anywhere in these countries from any particular spot. Jack and Maureen had used his next show and tell offering in their travels, which was a *Sherlock Holmes Walking Map of London*.

9. Dueling Prohibited and Reichenplague Installation Recalled

Our Sovereign Emeritus, Patrick, brought a highly relevant but seldom circulated document, a copy of our Bimetallic Question constitution, delightfully notable for its item forbidding the not-that-long-ago common practice of dueling. Also gleaned from his personal archive of Society documents for our enjoyment this evening were articles concerning our installation, in cooperation with the Swiss Sherlock Holmes society, the Reichenbach Irregulars, of a commemorative plaque at the Reichenbach Falls. Patrick represented our Society at the plaque's installation there in May 1992.

We were invited to solve a mystery during the course of our meeting when Patrick passed a book around the table without announcing its title, but noting that it would be a tome of special significance to one of us in attendance this evening. It was finally revealed that the book, *Bauxite, Sugar and Mud: Memories of Living in Colonial Guyana*, by P. Wendy Dathan holds special meaning for Wilfrid, who in fact was born there. Patrick generously offered the book to him as a gift, but perhaps we shouldn't be surprised to hear that Wilfrid, as an antiquarian bookseller, already had a copy of it at home in his own collection, a fitting surprise twist to our mystery.

Wilfrid recently received from a neighbour the complete Sherlock Holmes adventures in two volumes and offered them to anyone not having these already. Kathryn Radford accepted these fine books.

Paul Billette wanted to take some time to thank David, our Co-founder/Scribe/Recording Secretary, and Susan our Secretary for the excellent work that they do on the minutes. Susan took a moment to explain how her other roles of Webmaster and Tin Box/Archivist are interrelated, as much of her role as archivist involves scanning paper documents and converting them into digital files to post on our website. She thanked members for their patience during this process, and announced that we can soon look forward to new website postings, of "vintage" Society minutes from our paper archive. Susan also thanked her very special cat Esmeralda for all her help and encouragement with these endeavours. After all, who better to assist in cat-alouging an archive?

13. Conan Doyle's Former Home

When Wilfrid and his wife Susan Ravdin were in England recently, they had the opportunity to pass by Conan Doyle's former home Undershaw, in Hindhead, Surrey and took some photos of it which they emailed out to us. Undershaw, the Conan Doyle residence from 1897-1907, has now been converted to a school for the disabled.

Miyako discussed the book, *The Mysterious World of Sherlock Holmes*, by Bruce Wexler, who wrote of how the family had moved to Surrey from London after Touie was diagnosed with tuberculosis, in hopes of providing a healthier environment for her. In this era Conan Doyle also met Jean Leckie, whom he would marry years later following Touie's death.

19. Toast to Mrs. Hudson by Paul

Good evening fellow Sherlockians,

For tonight, I decided to do a little research in Wikipedia and to share with you some interesting information concerning Mrs. Hudson found on the site.

First a review of the portrayals she has been depicted as in the film and video media and then a particularly intriguing imagery from Japan.

In the Canon, she has been identified with the name "Martha" in His Last Bow;

at one point in A Scandal in Bohemia Holmes calls the landlady "Mrs Turner";

in the BBC series *Sherlock*, in *His Last Vow* her name is revealed to be **Martha Louise Hudson** (née **Sissons**), a semi-reformed alcoholic and former exotic dancer;

a transgender Miss Hudson appears in the 19th episode of the US series *Elementary* as an expert in Ancient Greek who essentially makes a living as a kept woman and muse for various wealthy men;


in Sherlock Holmes's War of the Worlds it is suggested that Holmes and Mrs. Hudson had a long-lasting love relationship, obvious to all but the naive Watson;

in the anthology *Two Hundred Twenty-One Baker Streets*, Mrs. Hudson is portrayed as a circus dwarf in Jamie Wyman's story *A Scandal in* Hobohemia.

From Japan, produced by the giant of the entertainment industry TMS anime in the series *Sherlock Hound*, Mrs. Hudson is depicted as a younger woman, and a widow of a pilot named Jim. In this incarnation, her full name is revealed to be **Marie Hudson**, and fitting with the theme of the characters being canines, she resembles a Golden Retriever. She normally stays behind at 221B Baker Street, but accompanies Hound and Watson on a few cases, usually any that involve something related to flight, and is shown to be a very skilled driver, pilot, and marksman. She is once kidnapped by Professor Moriarty and his henchmen as a part of a scheme to defeat Hound, though Moriarty vows to never involve her in his schemes after she shows him kindness during the time she's kept as a hostage. Additionally, it's shown that most of the main male cast of the series (namely Hound and especially Watson) are attracted to her.

In whatever her various incarnations she always shows the necessary strength to minister the daily needs of her most famous tenant.

Discussion on the guiz story:

The general consensus of most members was that this was not a very good story; Carol used the word "dumb". Even Baring-Gould felt that this was one of the worst. The misinterpretation of the "dry towel" by the pool made the solution a little more difficult. Bruno likened Holmes's writing style to suspiciously like Watson's. Wilfrid was surprised to learn that Holmes was a swimmer. Kathryn did not think this was your typical Holmes. It was as if he was in a "nightmare", as she described it.

Miyako noted Conan Doyle's mention of McPherson's "Burberry" overcoat and did some detective work to discover more about this company, finding that it was founded in 1856 by draper's apprentice Thomas Burberry who was only 21 at the time. In the 1870s he introduced fabric made from a naturally water-resistant yarn. Today the luxury fashion house Burberry thrives, and Miyako noted how it has more stores in her native Japan (39) than it does in Britain (23) because of the sophistication the

brand has come to symbolize for the public there and around the world. Do any of our Society members own Burberry products?

Miyako recalled how when she was small, in the southwest of Japan where she is from, her family could enjoy summer swimming in the sea, but only until the end of August, as the Jellyfish were coldwater species and only made their presence (painfully) felt in cooler temperatures.

She also found it significant and surprising in *The Lion's Mane* how Holmes, who always seemed to have no interest in the fairer sex except for Irene Adler, was in this story very much impressed by the beauty of the young Maud Bellamy, asking "...who could have imagined that so rare a flower would grow from such a root and in such an atmosphere?"

Miyako also wonders who is the unnamed housekeeper in the story? Mrs. Hudson?

I [David] took from *The Lion's Mane* a small but significant similarity that I had read in another adventure:

Where Have I Seen This Before?

"Sad story this, sir, about Mr. McPherson's dog", said she one evening.

I do not encourage such conversations, but the words arrested my attention.

"What of Mr. McPherson's dog?"

"Dead, sir. Died of grief for its master."

- "...found it dead, down on the beach, sir, at the very place where its master met his end." (In actual fact not so as McPherson died on the patch half way up the cliff.)
- "...it lay on the very edge of the pool."
- "...the body was stiff and rigid [redundant] the eyes projecting and the limbs contracted."

The solution to this case hinged on the discovery of the dead dog and its precise condition and location. A dog and its inaction guided Holmes to the solution in *The Adventure of Silver Blaze*. Both incidents were "curious" and "pivotal".

21. Miyako's British Entertainment News Notes


Miyako reports how *Sherlock Holmes* star Robert Downey Jr. is a big hit as the Marvel Comics Iron Man...And the latest venture for *Sherlock Holmes* director Guy Ritchie is *King Arthur: Legend of the Sword,* starring Jude Law who played Watson opposite Downey's Holmes.

Milo Parker who played the little boy in *Mr. Holmes* is continuing in his role as the young Gerald Durrell in the hit TV series *The Durrells*, entering its second season as really fine and much appreciated family entertainment and a big treat for all animal lovers. Miyako quotes our member in England, Joe Marino who said in his toast to the Master at our last Birthday Dinner, "You don't need sex and violence to spin a good tale." In Japan in the 1970s she and her family loved *Little House on the Prairie*.

Grantchester's Sidney and Geordie follow in the footsteps of Holmes and Watson as a great detective duo in this series highly recommended by Miyako. The show often explores the challenge of love versus duty in 1950s Britain, as Sidney is an English clergyman who is in love with his childhood sweetheart Amanda, and since she is a divorced woman he is not allowed to marry her. It is a valuable look back at this time in our shared social history.

Miyako feels that the heir apparent to the popularity of *Downton Abbey* is *Poldark*, set in 18th century Cornwall and now confirmed to enter a fourth season. We can all enjoy it on PBS. Mark Gatiss, who plays Mycroft Holmes in *Sherlock* is a writer for *Poldark*.

We all know how Conan Doyle included Royalty in his Sherlock Holmes adventures, and this is a big trend in current productions. Miyako and her husband are finding *King Charles III*, new on DVD, to contain fascinating storytelling. It dramatizes a Royal household following the imagined death of Queen Elizabeth II. The late Tim Pigott-Smith plays Charles who wants to get into politics but not as a symbol only. The show's writer Mike Barlett uses other real living Royal characters: Camilla, William and Kate (our Canadian girl from the West Island), and Harry, with many issues for us to consider in all their private lives. Miyako says, "I felt so sorry for Harry who fell in love with an Afro British girl but decided to break off the relationship." Living life under scrutiny from almost the entire world is difficult.
